- Your 2020/2021 Annuals will be arriving soon at your homes. If you've not yet ordered one, you can place your order on the <u>ESAA website</u>.
- On February 5th, the ESAA board had an emergency meeting regarding to the future of the Annual. There was a lot of discussion by board members with feedback from their regions. After all the facts were taken into consideration, the board voted to no longer create the Annual until further notice. It was an extremely difficult decision and not taken lightly. ESAA invested a substantial amount of money on the contracted 2018/'19 and 2020/'21 Annuals. The decision was made for the following reasons:
- 1. The cost of production, goods, services, and printing have become extremely expensive, and ESAA can no longer afford to produce an Annual.
- 2. Volunteers did not come forward to assist with collecting data.
- 3. It appears there's a lack of interest in the Annual: fewer ads were submitted and with the last two volumes printed, there were many left over.

With many of these facts, the membership sent us a message. During our pause, ESAA will continue to retain vital historical information beginning with 2022 until the pause is lifted.

• I presented the option of a quarterly magazine, but the board felt we needed to put a pause on all options for now and revisit it once ESAA has recouped some of the funds spent on the last four years of Annuals, as our losses were substantial.

- I am excited to announce that Asha Nahas will be our new ESAA Newsletter editor. Thank you, Asha, for volunteering. Welcome to the ESAA team. She will start with the March and April newsletter.
- A *sincere* thank you to Linda Lauby for her work as the past editor. You did an amazing job! We are grateful for so many of your contributions. You will always be a valued member of the ESAA volunteer team. Thank you for all of your contributions.
- Another difficult decision the board made was to no longer fund the National Trophy Fund with \$10 from every membership, due to financial constraints. Kathy Cunningham Roy has offered to be our National Trophy Fundraiser Chairperson. Thank you, Kathy, for stepping up to chair this committee. Please be generous when Kathy asks for your donation.
- The unfortunate truth of the matter is that hosting Nationals and field events at any venue has become very expensive. Everything from room rates, ballroom rental, facility charges, electric rates, wranglers, birds, food and beverages, equipment rental, judges, and superintendents have skyrocketed, not to mention that entries are down across the sport. Our Nationals have been operating at a loss for the last couple of years, and this affects ESAA's treasury.
- There is a <u>new form</u> under "Members Only" to provide feedback, comments, or to ask questions. Everything comes directly to me. So, if you have any comments, positive suggestions or are willing to volunteer, please reach out. I ran on being a members' president, so I want to hear from you. I will keep a log and present all feedback to the board.

All Things NATIONAL:

These notes are based on remarks I made at the National banquet but revised and expanded.

Looking at the entire entry of this National, I would say our breed is in very good shape. This is from the perspective of someone who judges all the sporting breeds at all-breed shows and breed and group specialties. Yay us!

All the entries in the Best of Breed class were quality, and I had to go to details to be able to make cuts. After multiple cuts, I was left with a group of symmetrical, typey, athletic movers who checked all my boxes. I was looking for balance (front matches rear) with proper angulation (approaching 90 degrees) front and rear. Our standard does not address proportion (I wish it did!) but I think if you talk to most experienced breeders, they would say that our English Setters should be slightly longer than tall. According to our standard, height should be about 24 inches for bitches and about 25 inches for dogs. As for length of leg, my opinion is that we should be about 50:50 from withers to elbow and elbow to ground. The dogs are maintaining their size pretty well, but some bitches are smaller than what the standard calls for. I challenge breeders to preserve the approximate heights called for in the standard. Also, we want to avoid looking long and low or leggy.





BREEDER PROFILE: Windem English Setters



ATTENTION: Regional Club Secretaries and Specialty Chairs

Opportunities for Majors at Specialties

(Starting July 3, 2024)

A modification to Chapter 16, Section 1 of the <u>AKC Rules Applying to Dog Shows</u> was approved by the Delegate body at their December meeting. The modification provides all specialty clubs the option for the Reserve Winners Dog and Reserve Winners Bitch to earn a three-point major provided that the number of dogs competing in the regular classes of the Reserve Winner's sex totals at least twice the number required for a five-point major in the region in which the event is held. Previously, this option was only available at a breed's National Specialty. Clubs must opt out on their event application if they do not want this option available at their specialty show.

Conformation Applications and Panels Due at Least 18 Weeks Prior to Closing

As a reminder, event applications and judges' panels for conformation shows must be submitted at least eighteen (18) weeks prior to the closing of entries. So that they comply with the rules, we recommend that clubs set a goal to submit their applications and panels six months prior to the date of their event. This will provide ample time for processing applications and panels, and to resolve anything needed for approval.
